Our La Jolla Chapter of NLYM had a busy and productive fourth year, as our mother-son organization continued to foster the development of the Young Men through philanthropy, leadership, protocol and culture. This year, our 109 young men members logged 4,280 hours of direct philanthropy, helping over 40 organizations in our local community and across the globe. They made a great impact by helping those with physical and mental challenges, cleaning up beaches and parks, and working at food banks and soup kitchens, just to name a few examples. They also organized blood drives and helped at various events around town.

Meals on Wheels remained one of our most rewarding philanthropies, with many mother-son teams stepping up to help with routes. Mothers also joined their sons in volunteering at our popular all-league events such as the Salvation Army Toy & Joy Shop set-up. In April, a group of our young men and their parents traveled to Tijuana to build a house for a family through Project Mercy. This was the fourth house that our chapter has built and was once again one of the most poignant and moving service works for the participants.

At grade level meetings, officers developed their leadership skills by conducting the meeting following parliamentary procedures. They also enjoyed protocol lessons at their meetings and attended cultural events as a class.

Thanks to our great gala committees, this year we had three successful and fun events. The Senior Send-Off celebrated the Class of 2018 at the San Diego Yacht Club (SDYC). This senior class was our chapter's first founding class to have completed all four years of NLYM programming. The Etiquette Dinner was another fun evening at the SDYC where our Class of 2019 hosted the National Charity League (NCL) young ladies for a formal dinner. They had a chance to practice the dinner etiquette they had learned as part of their protocol lesson at the previous meeting. The year culminated in our fourth annual Compass Dinner, which celebrated the accomplishments of the Young Men throughout the year. This beautiful event was held at a new venue and in attendance were mothers, sons, and other family members. In addition to our NLYM awards, we were happy to hand out our Presidential Volunteer Service Awards to honor all their efforts and many hours of philanthropy.

As always, our members define the success of the chapter with their commitment, hard work, and enthusiasm. It's been an honor to serve as President of our chapter, and I thank my dedicated board of directors for their excellent work this year. I look forward to continuing to strengthen and grow the La Jolla Chapter under the leadership of next year's President Lisa Barnhouse-Gal. Have a relaxing summer and see you in the fall!

Upon arriving to the venue, the young men had their photos taken individually, later gathering for an etiquette presentation taught by Mr. Ehmann to learn about how to escort the young ladies, eat with proper technique, and behave with manners proper for a formal dinner party.

Shortly after, both groups searched to find their assigned partner while

attempting to not step on any toes or trip, lest they embarrass themselves! After everyone had found their partner, there was a brief social where time. partners exchanged corsages and boutonnieres, talked and got to know each other. During this time, everyone slowly eased into the flow



of things, realized there was nothing to be nervous about, and lowered their heart rates! From that point on, the young men and young ladies had a large group photo taken, switched partners, and went on to spend the rest of the night eating and chatting around large dinner tables, which seated about 10 people each. The food was fantastic and the service was great.

FATHER JOE'S VILLAGES Alex Mesri, Class of 2020



The Class of 2020 fed the homeless at Father Joe's Villages in Downtown San Diego for their Spring Philanthropy. At first, I was nervous about volunteering since I had not really worked with the homeless before. We were all assigned tasks to prepare for breakfast. As we were doing this, we could see a very long line forming outside. The doors were open at 9am and we served breakfast to about 615 men and women until 11:30am. The men and women we served were all so thankful and appreciative of the food and more so for

us taking the time to volunteer. My assignment was at the drink station and I was very busy serving them their morning coffee. I could barely keep up. I couldn't believe how many people were served, and this was just a typical morning. I now realize many of the homeless have fallen on hard times and don't have family to support them. Others have mental health issues and don't have access to proper healthcare. I would definitely like to volunteer to serve meals at Father Joe's Villages again.

VIKINGS FOR VETS Katherine and Tynan Walsh, Class of 2021

Vikings for Vets (V4V) was formed just over a year ago. Finn Walsh, a senior at La Jolla High School, and his two brothers and NLYM members Cavan (Class of 2019) and Tynan (Class of 2021), and his sister Delaney worked together to launch V4V and organize members. Their first event was the Vikings for Vets 5K Run For Veterans which raised over \$1,500 for the Paralyzed Veterans of America (PVA), Cal-Diego Chapter. NLYM volunteers included

Together the YM helped the V4V Club set up and break down the event, and staffed different stations during the three scheduled run times. They checked in participants, handed out water to the runners, counted laps during the races, made event announcements and kept the music

playing from the media box. The participants and volunteers had a great time helping a great cause, cheering on runners, and finding out how the PVA helps improve the quality of life for many men and women who have served our country.

MEALS ON WHEELS Sandra and Jack Munson, Class of 2021

Meals on Wheels is such a simple concept - able body volunteers deliver meals to those who cannot easily get to stores, or prepare food on their own. The recipients are always so

gracious, and quick to thank us for our effort and time. You never know what you are going to experience when delivering a meal. Jack really looks forward to seeing what show Ruth is watching on TV (once it was Sponge Bob; another time it was a cooking show). We also like to see if Thomas is pleased with our promptness - his comments generally range from "wow you are early" to "wow you are late!" Once we were given a home tour, a history of their international travels, and descriptions of the art sculptures the husband had created. Delivering meals also provides a healthy dose of appreciation for



our health and resources as many of recipients suffer from mental illness, loneliness and physical debilitation. I hope as our commitment with Meals on Wheels continues, we get to know each recipient a little more on a personal level.

National League of Young Men (NLYM) is a non-profit organization for young men in grades 9-12; this structured program for mothers and their sons promotes the development of young men into community leaders through leadership involvement, cultural experiences, charitable and community service, and protocol education.

ABOUT US

The La Jolla Chapter of the National League of Young Men, Inc. was founded in May, 2014, to provide young men an opportunity to serve their community while gaining valuable leadership skills, along with protocol knowledge and cultural experiences. The La Jolla Chapter is one of thirteen chapters nationally. The program is open to young men, and their mothers, who reside in or attend school in the La Jolla zip code 92037.

The La Jolla Chapter's first year, 2014-15, consisted of 9th and 10th grade classes. Each year we added a new class until we had a complete membership of 9th-12th grade classes, consisting of about 200 members. In May 2017 our first class graduated and in May 2018 our first class to have completed all four years of the NLYM program graduated. We now have 27 sustaining and life members.

This year our 109 Young Men served 4,280 hands-on hours at local San Diego charities, and throughout the world. They have organized blood drives, applied for grants and volunteered for causes ranging from Challenged Athletes Foundation, I Love A Clean San Diego, The Salvation Army, and Meals on Wheels Greater San Diego to local food banks, natural parks, senior centers, and youth groups.

Young men also attend meetings, during which they learn important life skills such as time management, leadership, relationship building and protocol. They hold positions on their grade level board of directors and learn valuable skills in communications, team building and follow-through. At the end of four years, our Young Men members are well-rounded individuals who have developed leadership skills, distinctive manners and compassion for their community.
